







John was a "people person" who never ran dry of words

He brought his own sunshine.









But many of us can recall shared hours on bikes and trails. They were always special times.






He liked to show off his engineering skills with his "famous" home-made Potato Cannon.







Dedication of the John R. Andrews Bridge over Rte 1 in Saco














But beyond and above the awards, the mounted plaques, and the monuments is the indelible memory of a dedicated and forward-looking man.
